The Vision Expands

For several years we have had a very good Bible school at New Missions. This year we started a business school. Next year we will open an education department.

> Royal Caribbean Institute Associate degree programs

Bible Business Education

Each of these programs will be for two years. After a student graduates from one program he or she may continue taking courses from the other two programs. The student will receive an associate degree upon completing one program. The student can then take general courses and electives from the other two programs to earn enough credits for a four-year Bachelors degree.

The ground is being prepared for the construction of three additional classrooms at the site of the Royal Caribbean Institute. Special classrooms are needed for teaching computer and typing. At least one classroom will be outfitted for video presentations. Construction is planned to begin the second week of January.

Birthdays, anniversaries, and annual holidays are a good time to reflect on the events that have taken place in the past year. We all like to measure progress.


This year we will cel-



Road Construction

The roads in Haiti are so rough. The dirt road that goes from the highway to our mission is now being repaired. Over 200 truckloads of gravel are being spread, and run off ditches dug along the side of the road.

Purpose and Vision

Often people who visit our mission ask, "what is the purpose of New Missions? "Why are you working in Haiti?" I am always glad to share our vision.

Haiti has a long history of mismanagement. Leaders have often used their political office for their own financial gain. The consequences have been a high illiteracy rate, a lack of development, 80% unemployment, poverty, and disease.

We do not believe that Haiti will change overnight and become like America.

First and foremost we have come to Haiti because God has sent us here. We are on a mission for the Lord. Second: We are working to raise up a new generation of people in Haiti. The cycle of corruption, poverty, ignorance, and superstition needs to come to an end. A new generation needs to be established.

Third: Real change takes place on the inside. This is where we begin and upon what we build. When a person believes in the Lord Jesus, the Holy Spirit comes to live within creating a new person. At that time, old things pass away, and all things become new. II Cor. 5:18. Our first responsibility in Haiti is to bring people to faith in Jesus Christ.

Fourth: Then change begins to come to the other areas of life. Education provides intellectual and social change. Opportunities for employment open up and economic change takes place. And this new generation, I believe, will one day effect the political climate of the country.

We at New Missions are concentrating our time, finances, and spiritual energy here on the Leogane Plain. Thousands of children and young people are coming to know Jesus as Savior and receiving a quality education. We are raising up a new generation in Haiti.

God is faithful to accomplish His work. Our task is to stay focused and close to Him.



God At Work

God was at work in my life since I was a young boy. At the time, I often did not recognize it. Now looking back, I clearly see that He was leading me.

I was born in the town of Gonaives. After I finished high school, I attended a Catholic seminary in preparation for the priesthood. First I attended a seminary in Turgo and then the Grand Seminary in Cazeau. After seminary I worked at St. Michel de L. Atlalage for three years. This was all in preparation for my ordination.

One day while visiting in the capital city, of Port-au-Prince, I walked by a church. The people were singing, with excitement, about the things of God. I went into the church, and when the pastor gave the message, I felt God speaking to me. After the service the Pastor prayed with me and led me to a personal knowledge of Jesus Christ. That day my life was changed.

The pastor of the church was Selondieu Pierre. Later I learned that he was the General Superintendent of the primary schools at New Missions. Selondieu suggested that I go and talk with Rev. George DeTellis, the director of New Missions, about work at the mission. I enrolled in the New Mission Bible School and studied there for two years.

When I lived in
Gonaives, I had a high school
sweetheart. I went back to
Gonaives and married her.
Together we have two sons.
Presently, I am the director of
the clinic and the pastor of the
New Missions church in Bire.
My wife is a school teacher and
the director of the elementary
school in Bire.

Our lives have been changed. Now we are happy serving the Lord at New Missions in Haiti.

Road Construction Up-date

The gravel road leading to our mission is well under way to being repaired. There are 131 men and women working on the road with picks, shovels, hoes, and wheel barrows. Gravel is being spread and drain ditches are being dug. This is an eight-week project that soon will be completed.

Business School Up-date

A much needed building is under construction at our Signeau campus. This building will be used for the Royal Caribbean Institute. This is where our Bible school and business school will meet.

Presently, in our business school, I am teach-

ing a course in English and another in Money and Banking. This is the first time I have taught the graduates of our high school. I am amazed at the level of their intelligence and competency. It is rewarding to teach in our business school.

God Speaks and Delivers

Medical Clinic Development

Three women, their suitcases full of laboratory supplies, came to Haiti to establish a laboratory at our New Missions clinic. Gail Fracassa, Diane Edward, and Lisa Holland are from Rhode Island.

All three of these women are highly trained professionals. Gail and Lisa both work for Howard Community Health. Gail is the Lab Supervisor and Lisa is a staff Technician. Lisa also has a BS in nursing. Diane is a Clinical Lab Scientist at Women and Infants Hospital.

These three women spent months in preparation, assembling instruments, supplies, and text books. Throughout their preparation they prayed for help and guidance from God for their medical mission endeavor.

Our New Missions clinic began with a table under a canopy of coconut trees and a box of medicines. The clinic has grown to include a general, pre-natal, post-natal, and a nutrition program. Now with a laboratory in place, we are able to test for: Malaria, bacterial gram stains, Anemia, parasitic detection, urinalysis, wet preps for genital infections, skin fungal infections, and Pregnancy tests.

Lisa said, "I wanted the trip to be what God wanted it to be." "This was God's next step in the development of the clinic, it was like putting in the next piece of the puzzle," shared Gail. Diane said, "we prayed and everything came together." The very first day that they put the lab in place, a patients' blood was found to be infected with malaria. Gail, Diane, and Lisa want to help keep the laboratory supplied with necessary items. They plan to return on an annual basis, to provide further development and inspiration.

We thank all of you who support the medical clinic. Your financial gifts are helping to provide vital medical attention.

Remember, the devil wants to put you down and keep you down; Jesus wants to lift you up and keep you up.


In the end - Job was fully restored, his possessions doubled, children were given to him, and he was esteemed by his friends. Job is a world example of how God cares for his own.

Abandoned Orphan

One day a little boy began to show up at our mission every night at dinnertime begging for food. We soon discovered that this boy was not from one of the local villages and did not attend the mission schools. As the story began to unfold we were told that some local fishermen found him in Lew Cays, about 100 miles from our area. We were told that this boy had no parents and was an orphan.

Out of compassion these fishermen brought Michelin to come live in their village of Neply with the hope that New Missions would care for him. In Haiti the term often used for an orphan is Rastaveks. The literal translation is "to stay with". Abandoned children are often sent off to stay with relatives or friends to work as house servants in exchange for food and place to live. Michelin is now living in the village of Neply with the family of Marie Carmel Fatal, a New Missions' employee.

We thank God that he sent Michelin to come and join the New Missions school program. Scott Underwood, Garth's brother-in-law, was introduced to Michelin during a short-term mission trip to Haiti. When Scott returned home he called Garth and told him about Michelin. Recently Garth and Christin Knor from Casselberry, Florida began sponsoring Michelin.

Run With The Vision

The following are three essential ingredients of a worker for God:

FIRST: The worker for God has strong convictions. We need to know what we believe. Yes, there are areas of uncertainty where we are ever looking for better understanding, such as the nature of the second coming of Jesus Christ. The debate over eternal security rages in the church. But, there are areas where we take a strong stand.

We believe in God. We believe that Jesus is the Son of God and the Saviour of the world. We believe that God has spoken and His Words are written in a Book which we call the Scriptures. These truths are the basis of our lives, and for them we are willing to give our lives.

SECOND: We are growing spiritually. The Christian life is one of progress. We are ever learning to be conformed into the image of Jesus. In this life we will never arrive - we are always growing. To stop growing is to begin to regress. The last thing we would want is for the Lord to say we are "lukewarm". D. L. Moody said, "My life is a leaky vessel, I ever need to be refilled."

Growth is natural in all of life, and it is essential to our spiritual well-being. Hebrews 5:12 - 14.

THIRD: We are men and women of vision. We are not required to do every good thing, but we are required to do what God asks of us.

Vision comes from God. We receive the vision from Him and then pass it on to others.

In the Old Testament when there was no prophet through whom God could speak, the Bible said, "There was no open vision." 1 Samuel 3:1. Receive the vision from God then run with the vision.


God is at work in the world. Through His Son, He is reconciling the world unto Himself. God is at work in us showing Himself strong on our behalf. His grace sustains us,

During April, a group from Saddleback Community Church in Mission Viejo, California spent ten days ministering in Haiti. Ty and Cindy Rose led the group. Ty is on staff at Saddleback, he and Cindy have been friends of New Missions for ten years.

A Miracle Roof

My heart was pounding!
Finally, after many months of prayer and planning, the building to house the Royal Caribbean Institute was under construction. The site had been prepared months in advance. But weeks of construction on the road leading into our missions compound from the highway had delayed the work on the building.

The building we are putting up is directly across from the existing high school classrooms. The new building will mirror the existing building. It's the same design, with the same windows and doors and, of course, the same red roof tiles that are on all the buildings at the high school campus.

The windows and doors for the building were ordered, as the floor was poured and the blocks put in place. A beautiful ceramic tile was selected for the floor. I measured the roof and figured out that we needed 470 (of the six-foot tiles) to cover the roof.

Bouchard is the only company in Haiti that sells these tiles, which were imported from the Dominican Republic. Naturally, I went to them to order the roofing material. Over the years I have purchased thousands of tiles from them and have a good relationship with the owner. I went to his office. "Raymond," I said, "I need 470 tiles for a building I am putting up." "Sorry," he said, "I don't have any and will not be importing any more. The Haitian government is placing too heavy a tax on the tiles, and I would never be able to sell them to the Haitians at the new price." I thought, putting different roofing material on the new building would destroy the decor and look foolish.

Lord what shall I do? For days I prayed, pondering different options that I had. But none of them seemed right. "God there must be a solution. "Help," I prayed.


That Sunday evening we had a staff meeting and a time of prayer with our mission team. "Pray with me" I asked and shared my dilemma with them. After the meeting I stepped out of the back door of the lounge where we were meeting and looked up at our storage building, and God said to me, "There is your roof!" The storage building had the exact same roof that is on the high school building. Immediately I measured the building. It was 95 feet long, and the building we were putting up was 91 feet long. more than enough of what we needed.

The next day we began removing the tiles. Within a week the tiles were off, in excellent condition, and a metal roof was put on the storage building. This experience reminded me that God is the answer to our every need. Never despair. Pray. God delights to give us miracles, even the miracle of a red roof.

We often feel that we are being stretched! The Lord expands our horizons and gives us new tasks to perform. The stretching is often painful and exhausting. We have come to learn that this stretching is part of the growth that shows how God is working in our lives. Excited in seeing what God is doing in our lives - we go on. We need your prayers. We love you.



Dacheca Joseph is graduating from kindergarten this year and moving on to the first grade the beginning of a miracle of change. She attends our school in the village of TiRiviere. Dacheca is waiting for someone to sponsor her.

The Work Goes On

Even while we are putting the finishing touches on the Royal Caribbean Institute building, we are making plans for our next building.

It is absolutely necessary that we put up a church building in Leogane. The congregation has prayed and waited several years for an adequate place to meet.

A school building was erected at the Leogane site in 1993, but the congregation has been meeting in an old rumery on the property. The building is nothing more than a tin shed where sugar cane was pressed and the syrup was used to make "clarin," a rum used by the local people. The building is old and is about ready to fall down.

In August we are planning to ship a container to Haiti with school supplies. In the container we will also put lumber needed for the roof of the building and material to construct church benches.

Many of you who have come to New Missions have visited the church in Leogane. You know the great need for a building. Please pray. We believe that the time has come to build a church in Leogane to the glory of God. "The people said, 'Let us rise up and build.' Then they set their hand to do this good work." Nehemiah 2:18.



Ti Cabrit (Little Goat)

"I thought he would be dead by now." That was what was often said about Michelet Moise. As a small boy, Michelet often sat naked in the dirt with his hands covering his eyes. The Haitians believe that when his mother was large with child, she looked into the eyes of a goat as it was being butchered. Therefore, her child was born disfigured. To this day, Michelet is called, "Ti Cabrit," little goat.

Today Michelet is a young boy 13 years of age. He attends our school and is in church all the time. Just today he told me "I love Jesus."

I believe that if Michelet did not receive the love and nutrition provided by New Missions, he may well not be alive today. Those of us who know Michelet love him. He is a kind, funloving boy -a part of New Missions.

The Kiss Of Heaven

"The gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable" Romans 11:29. The gifts and the calling have been given to us and will never be retracted.

The work of the Holy Spirit is a myriad. We are gifted and graced by the Holy Spirit. He leads, empowers, and gives us wisdom and knowledge. The Comforter has come.

One of the outstanding works of the Holy Spirit is to anoint. The anointing comes with the call and the gifts cause them to function efficiently. The anointing enables. It is the touch of the Divine. It is the kiss of heaven. The anointing makes the difference between the mundane and the magnificent.

When I pastored in the States, every Sunday I graded my message as far as its effectiveness to communicate God's word to the hearts of the people in the congregation. I graded myself from one to five. One meant that I blew it; five, I was at my best. Needless to say, every time I preached, I strove to know the anointing and to preach a full five.

You cannot declare the anointing for yourself, nor can you give it to another. We are reminded of Jesus' words, "You did not choose Me, but I chose you and appointed you that you should go and bear fruit, and that your fruit should remain" John 15:16. God alone can give a ministry to a man or a woman. God called Moses, Isaiah, Gideon, and Samuel. Elijah did not call Elisha. He even tried to discourage Elisha. God places men and women in places of leadership. God sent me to Haiti and placed an anointing on the mission. I didn't ask for it. Now, I pray that one day the anointing will come upon someone else to continue the work that I've started. I can pray, but I cannot decide who the person will be. That is the work of the Holy Spirit.

God often chooses the seemingly incompetent to do His work so that God may receive the glory. Moses said, "I cannot speak," Isaiah said; "I'm sinful." Gideon said, "I am a nobody." Samson is a good example of God choosing ordinary people to do extraordinary things. Under the anointing, the Philistines trembled. Without the anointing he was "like other men." "...Not many wise according to the flesh, not many mighty, not many noble are called" 1-Corinthians 1:26.

The call and gifts need to remain. The anointing is enjoyed so long as we are true to Jesus. We live in relation to God the Father through Jesus Christ. Sterile gifts come about by a lack of obedience. So long as we walk in dependent humility to the Son of God, we will enjoy the richness of His anointing. Under the anointing, God will use us mightily to show Himself to the World.

God delights in showing His goodness in many different ways. The evenings in Haiti have been especially delightful. The afternoons get hot - about 90 degrees. Later in the day,

a cool breeze comes down off the mountains behind us that is exhilarating.

I pray that God will visit both the United States and Haiti with a move of His Spirit, and that these countries will serve the Lord and bring a moral change to the people. God bless you.


Even when I am not aware of any specific wrong doing, every day I pray, "Lord, forgive me of my sins." I want nothing to come between God and me. My relationship with

A New Church Building For Leogane



the Jews." We share with Christ
in His kingship and when we
serve - we rule.

Now the entire community draws pure water from the well throughout the day.




The U. S. military drilled a well at our primary school in the village of Signeau. This was the last well they drilled before leaving Haiti.

My particular portion of the garden to keep is Haiti. Haiti is full of confusion, superstition, fear, and oppression. What a place for God to work.


May I ask you, "Where is your garden?" I encourage you to be faithful in doing the things of God.



One favorite trick of his is to try to convince us that evil is good or that God does not have our best interests in mind. Satan entered the Garden of Eden as a serpent. That in itself was deception. He then worked cunningly to bring about the fall of Adam and Eve.

Sometimes we are deceived by an enemy. Our belief in the Gospel sets us in opposition with others. We believe that Jesus is the only Saviour of the world. Our faith is in Jesus Christ and the work of the cross. Naturally, many people will not agree with us. Because of our stand for Jesus, some people may feign friendship and then work toward our failure. Haitians have an expression, "trompa," which means to trick or fool. They may trick you out of goods or money or trick you into doing them a favor. We should expect that some people will try to deceive us in this world.

Some people become deceived by a friend. That hurts! When we have put confidence in another person only to be betrayed, it's painful. Judas was part of the inner circle of trusted disciples, yet with a kiss he betrayed a friend. May our prayer be, "Lord help me to be true to my friends and may my friends be true to me."

There is a deception more devastating and more subtle than all of the above: selfdeception. Sometimes we fool
ourselves. "But be doers of the
word, and not hearers only,
deceiving yourselves," James
1:22. We rationalize and provide reason to back up our
wrong conduct. That is why
reason is subject to revelation.
We need to submit our minds
and our thinking to the Word of
God.





Leogane Construction Project Update

This month (December), preparation will begin on the site for the church in Leogane. First, a deep hole will be dug with our backhoe to determine what is underground. If the material is hard, then we will only have to bring in enough gravel to bring the site up to grade. However, if the material is soft, we have two options; one is to pour a foundation, and the other is to remove the soft material before filling the area with gravel. At several other sites in the past, as many as 200 truck loads of gravel had to be brought in.

After the site is prepared, a form will be constructed and a concrete slab poured. The slab will be eight inches on the perimeter and four inches in the center.

I am especially excited about the construction of the Leogane church. With great patience, this congregation has waited several years for a building. The town of Leogane has approximately 7,000 people. The church is presently meeting in one of the school classrooms. The church building will greatly enhance our outreach to this community.

We Have An Anchor

One of the themes of our mission since the day we arrived has been, "Haiti, hope in God."

In the Bible, the anchor is the symbol of hope. Hope speaks of the future. It is believing that good things are coming. We have hope for this life and for the life which is to come. "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and comes down from the Father of Lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow of turning," James 1:17. When we serve the Lord, we can expect good things to come to our lives.

An anchor is one of the necessary items on a well-outfitted boat. In fact, most boats have more than one anchor. A "lunch hook" is used for making short stops.
And every good boat carries a
"storm anchor." It is heavy
and designed to hold in bad
weather. In some situations, a
boat will put out two anchors
for added security. A wise
sailor lets out as much line as
he can when riding a storm.
The longer the line, the more
the anchor will hold.

Our anchor reaches into the Presence behind the veil. "This hope we have as an anchor of the soul, both sure and steadfast, and which enters the presence behind the veil," Heb. 6:19. Jesus entered the Holy of Holies in the heavenly temple. Our hope is not in some transient system or mortal person. It is in the eternal God.

Within the veil of the

earthly temple was the mercy seat. Every year when the High Priest sprinkled the mercy seat with the blood of an innocent animal, Israel found pardon for sin and a renewed relationship with God. Today, the mercy seat of God is the cross. Jesus died and shed His blood so that we might be made right with God. The work of the cross is the only means of reconciliation. Our hope is in Jesus.


Our anchor will never fail. Regardless of the storms of life, we are safe in Christ.
