CONSTRUCTION TEAM NAILS IT

In November, the first post earthquake construction team of 18 experienced men set foot in Haiti. Led by Mike McClanahan, men's pastor at First Baptist Hendersonville in Tennessee, the team undertook demolition, clean-up, repair and new construction.

For 15 of the 18 men, this was their first ever trip to Haiti. Imagine Haiti. Then imagine Haiti on the heels of an earthquake, a hurricane and a cholera outbreak. To date, New Missions has coordinated only limited and specialized teams. However, year round construction has been underway with Haitian construction teams.

The team surveyed sites and determined the high school church to be the highest priority. Its roof had been completely destroyed in the hurricane. What looked like two to three solid days of demolition and clean-up took three hours with the help of several Haitian villagers working alongside the Americans. The high school students watched in amazement as the team handled sharp clay roof tile and scrap lumber. Wooden church pews bolted to the floor were also removed.



"God took amazing care of His team," said McClanahan. "Among all that debris, we had no injuries. The Haitians were the hardest working men I've ever seen."

In addition to the high school church and other demolition, the team constructed 70 roof trusses, restored a critical water line and poured concrete footers for a new school.

A SPARK OF LIGHT IN THE DARKNESS

Every now and then a spark of light can come into your life. Allow me to explain. The story goes back sixteen years and begins when my parents were serving as missionaries in Haiti. My mother, Jeanne, was at the hospital when a mother died during childbirth and left the baby girl an orphan. The girl's father then abandoned the baby. My mother found other extended family to care for the child. The uncle was already working for the mission as a yard worker. The girl's name is Rose Varda Louis and her new mother's name was Jackie. Over the years I kept in touch with the family, and would help them with special gifts of food, clothing and school supplies. Jackie was a woman of great love and loved Rose as her very own.

Rose does not have a hard heart, in spite of her past. On the contrary—she has an abundance of joy. Once while doing some evangelism in the village of Concrab, I asked a group of children if they wanted to receive prayer. At first the children did not respond, but then Rose (10 years old at the time) came forward by herself. After Rose came forward, other children followed. Rose remains a leader in her local church and sings often during services. She is now 16 years old and is in high school.

Tragically, Jackie died last year leaving Rose motherless again. We gave Rose a summer job in our kitchen—where we prepare the meals for our teams. She loved the companionship of the other women, and I have allowed her to continue working after school hours.

Rose enjoys music and foreign languages, and we are encouraging her to continue working

in ministry with her music gifts. The faith of the Haitian people has always encouraged me. They have a dependent and childlike faith in God. He is all they have...and their faith in God changes everything! So, through our trials, let's not remain bitter, but let our light shine for all to see.

THE PASSIONATE CALLING

When God wants my attention He taps into what makes me passionate. He communicates with me by tugging at the issues close to my heart. Proverbs 4:23 says, "Keep and guard your heart with all vigilance and above all that you guard, for out of it flow the springs of life." From my heart is where my real core produces the energy to be effective in my calling.

God wants me to be passionate, not simply interested in my calling. To be passionate requires energy. As 2011 kicks off, many people begin to make New Year's resolutions. On the top of my list is energy management. For years I have been a student of time management and productivity principles. The concept of getting things done through effective

systems and procedures makes 100% sense to me. I have my 90-day project outlook list and my annual master to-do list. Ask me how helpful those were the day after the historic Haiti earthquake. Not much help—because what needed management was not my time, but my energy.

Jesus knew how to manage His energy so that He could give 100% to His ministry. From His time in the garden and moments on the hillside, Jesus knew that time away meant energy restored so He could return and invest in others. These disciplines are necessary for an effective life, otherwise burnout is inevitable. "It is vain for you to rise up early, to retire late, to eat the bread of painful labors; for He gives to His beloved even in his sleep." Psalm 127:2

The area that is still a struggle for me is managing my energy, not my time. I'm spending all

my energy, which is the greater problem. This leads to a life running on empty—which can become the greater threat to burnout and poor decision making. I turned a major corner a few months ago and stopped working late into the night.

From Scripture I hold on to the story of Martha and Mary. The exact text in Luke 10:40 says, "But Martha was distracted by all the preparations that had to be made. She came to Him and asked, 'Lord, don't you care that my sister has left me to do the work by myself? Tell her to help me!" There comes a point when all the busy activities don't equal the accomplishment we need most...rest and restoration of our faith.

Personally, I'm passionate about my calling and now I'm protective of my energy. This keeps me

from being overly accessible. I'm very selective on where I invest my energy. However, I do maintain connectivity through social networking—which provides me the ability to stay in touch and communicate with many people at once and when

possible, to be personal, too.

I am reminded of Philippians 1:6-7, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

My heart's desire is to be consumed by the calling God has upon my life. It's like a flame versus a raging fire. I'm asking God to make this the year of shining! Let's shine for Jesus. ~Timothy DeTellis

CHANGED IN THE DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

"If you want to get people's attention—heal them," said Danny de Armas, administrative pastor for First Baptist Church of Orlando. In November, de Armas led a team of 48 on a medical mission trip to the D.R. The team got a good taste of what it was like 2,000 years ago during Jesus' ministry.

Unique to this team was not only the size but also the number of Spanish-speaking team members. First Baptist's Spanish ministry partnered with the church's American membership, resulting in nearly 20 team members who were able to speak one-on-one to the Dominicans in their native language with no translators.

The highlight of the trip was a 10-year-old boy who had a marble-sized cyst next to his eye. He was born this way and was very self-conscious—unable to even look at people. One of the physicians was able to remove the cyst in just 15 minutes, completely changing the boy's countenance. The boy's father made a special trip to the clinic to say that seeing his new boy was the best day of his life and what I could not provide, you gave me.

"After the boy's healing, Dominicans who knew him came to the clinic in curious excitement asking about the doctor who healed him and where it happened," said de Armas. "It was like when Jesus healed people. We felt like rock stars."

Although the team was firm that they would see only students for crowd control reasons, there was actually no "no" from this team. One of the school's headmasters begged de Armas for a favor explaining that one of the teachers had a sick two-year-old at home. No begging was necessary as de Armas quickly adjusted plans to include any staff and any family of staff. The last patient of the day was the headmaster himself.

"Our people engulfed them," said de Armas. "What a



great time of fellowship. One of the physicians said he'd never seen more patients in a single day. More than 1,500 Dominicans received care that week. The impact was amazing."

Shortly thereafter, I met with a contractor, and it happened to be the same day the earthquake hit Haiti—destroying 90 percent of our buildings. Now my dream seemed crazy. Would I be able to even persuade my leadership? But, I was convinced God was able to rebuild Haiti and to turn my dream into a reality.

In the Old Testament, Joseph had a dream that God would use him. In Genesis 39, we read five times that "God was with Joseph." That's all we need—God to be with us.

Pastor Tony Ponceti was in the Dominican Republic leading a Pastors' Seminar. Sharing my dream with him, he reached into his pocket and made the first donation for the construction. Ten months later, Pastor Tony returned, touched the building and dedicated it to God's purposes. During the dedication, I challenged the high school students to dream and believe God for His future construction in their lives.

God is with us just as He was with Joseph. We can keep dreaming God's dreams and allow God to use us to further His Kingdom. ~Jeanne DeTellis O'Connor

WHAT'S YOUR PROBLEM TO SOLVE?

HAVE A JOB TO DO...

A MISSION TO COMPLETE.

What's your problem to solve? The world is filled with problems. Global warming, government deficits, unemployment, environmental pollution...the list is endless. But, most of these problems are not your problem to solve. One day, I was talking with my brother Tim about a problem that was outside of my control, and I said, "That's not my problem to solve." That statement became a catch phrase for all the distractions of the news media. Global warming is not my problem to solve. I don't have the authority or the responsibility to even begin to solve the problem of global warming. The same is true for hundreds of other problems in our world today. It may sound selfish or insensitive, but most of the world's problems are not my problem to solve.

Recently, I had a dream that left me with a vivid message. In my dream, I was at a large gathering

of Christians, and we were singing and dancing in a worship service with thousands of people. In the worship service, I was shouting over and over, "This is my problem to solve! This is my problem to solve!" In my dream, I was so happy that I had a problem

to solve because I knew that God had given me this problem to solve. I knew God would give me the victory regardless of the circumstances, events, or the outward appearance of the problem. It was personal—this was my assignment from God to solve this problem. Has God given you a problem to solve? Each of us has an assignment. We all have a job to do...a mission to complete.

Often, my father would give me a problem to solve without much detailed explanation. There was a time when someone had donated property to us in Jamaica. There were numerous issues with the deed, and after many years the lawyer in Jamaica could not get things straightened out. In the end, we began to suspect the lawyer of trying to take advantage of us. In 1984, when I was 23 years old, my Dad sent me to Jamaica to go get the deed. I showed up at the lawyer's office unannounced on a Monday morning. She told me that I would need to go to Kingston. The next day I was on a small plane to Kingston, Jamaica. I came home with the deed, and we sold the land to a family in New Jersey the next month for cash to pay for our first buildings in Haiti. I did not know anything about the laws of Jamaica, whom to speak with, or where to go. I was only focused on one thing. Dad told me to come home with the deed. I remember praying all the way through that trip, and God provided the victory!

If you have a problem to solve, do not focus on

your enemies or the circumstances—focus on your God-given assignment.

In the Bible, there are many stories of men and women who were given an assignment from God to solve a problem, fight a battle, or liberate a people from a wicked ruler. One

of my favorite stories is that of Nehemiah who was given the assignment to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem. Nehemiah, who was focused exclusively on his mission, refused to discuss the issues with his enemies. If you will have that same focused determination, God will provide the victory. In the heat of the battle, remember the words of Nehemiah 4:20, "Our God shall fight for us."



BUILDING NEW SCHOOLS

We are rapidly working in Haiti to complete a number of new buildings. As of today, there are workers at three locations: our Bord-Mer warehouse, Bord-Mer school, and Concrab school. The new structure at the Calitor church is only waiting for the concrete floor and front steps to be completed. We have added more local workers to our construction crew, and our visiting U.S. teams have been a huge blessing with the new construction. John Schaefer, of Singers Glen, VA, is in Haiti for several months helping to oversee the construction, and a friend from Norway is also with us helping to construct three school buildings.

The earthquake was shattering to our infrastructure, and the last hurricane of 2010 destroyed the roof on our largest church at the high school property. Building a new church on this property is one of our top priorities. It is beautiful seeing the new buildings erected. There is definitely new life coming up from the rubble! We also grew this year by adding three school and church locations. We have never taken such a large leap of growth in the past. I sense the hand of God behind the work here in Haiti, and I count it a privilege to work in such a country. ~Charlie DeTellis

CAN YOU HEAR ME?

I call my parents from the Dominican Republic, and when Dad picks up the phone, he will often say, "I can't hear you." I want him to hear how I am and tell him what is happening. Have you ever had to ask someone to repeat what they said because you couldn't hear them? Not to hear or be heard can be a frustrating experience. Hearing is a communication of connecting and receiving news and direction for living.

People who are born deaf or have hearing difficulties in first-world countries, such as the United States, can seek medical attention for hearing deficiencies. In the Dominican Republic, deafness is often accepted as a fate in life. Where do you find an audiologist when you live up a mountain...where you do not have indoor plumbing or public transportation, much less a primary care medical facility? How do you travel a day's journey to seek help when you are barely surviving day by day earning minimum wage just to support your family?

New Missions is grateful to Dr. Laura Dennison, Eugene Harper, the Rotary Club of Duluth, GA, and Dr. Pat Biondi (from NJ) who organized a team to help such disadvantaged people find hearing solutions. Many people came to be evaluated, and more than a hundred hearing aids were fitted.

One of the most astounding cases was a 10-year old girl, Yerika Dilone, who was born deaf. Yerika was startled and bounced off her seat when she heard her own voice for the first time. When she heard the first sounds, she hit the sides of her head with the palms of both hands—trying to figure out what was going on. Where were these sounds coming from? As her mother watched

nearby, her heart burst with joy when Yerika said "Mama" for the first time!

The audiologist showed her how to clap her hands, and when she heard the sound, she smiled from ear to ear! You should have seen her come alive when she was given a drum with drumsticks.

Now she has a chance to learn to speak, receive a better education, someday gain employment, and live a life with the benefits of hearing, and will have the opportunity to "hear" about Jesus and His love for her. I appreciate the doctors and missionaries who helped these miracles happen.

This was our first hearing aid clinic, and our health center is a "preach and heal" center. At the waiting area, people were hearing the Good News and two healings were taking place.

DON'T SHIPWRECK YOUR FAITH

The biggest concern for any boater is to avoid loss of lives and property. This can occur by capsizing, sinking, or running upon rocks or coral... just to name a few. Our faith is a fight of faith, and we are not to shipwreck our faith. Some people may think that their faith cannot be shipwrecked. I do very much believe in the providential power of God to hold onto us. I also believe He gives us the liberty to make our own decisions.

We need to avoid the storm or the grounding. I don't think we intentionally aim our boat for the

rocks, but I do believe we can become reckless—asleep and not alert of our surroundings. A Norwegian friend of mine recently said, "When a boat sinks, many times the men have been travelling those same waters all their lives. But, they

become relaxed and fall asleep." The ocean can be overpowering. We must not become careless regarding our faith. We must stay focused—on course.

One of my favorite quotes from Pilgrim's Progress is, "One leak will sink a ship, and one sin will destroy a sinner."

We can find ourselves caught in the midst of a storm. In Haiti, my wife and I, along with six others, went to the little island of LaGonave—which is located 15 miles off our beach. We brought some

food to give to the people we were going to minister to. Upon our time to leave the island, the wind had really picked up. I tried twice to leave the island, but I had never navigated in such huge waves ever before. The waves were taller than the height of our 24-foot boat. I returned to the island and announced that we were going to have to spend the night. Thankfully, we had radio contact with my father back at the mission.

On the island we held a church service in a little building made of sticks. The church was full of people, and they were amazed to see the winds had stopped after we had church. The next morning we returned safely at the shores of our mission.

Wind and waves can represent obstacles. Will

you only serve God when you have clear skies and smooth sailing? Will you continue to serve God in the storm? Surely, your faith will be tested. Every day, I am very much aware of the decisions I make. "Therefore let us not sleep as


REAL CHANGE FOR HAITI

What does Haiti need now? Haiti needs godly leadership—people who wake up each day and ask, "How may we serve?" Since 1983 New Missions has focused on training a generation of Christian leaders. Currently, 2,064 high school and Bible college students are being prepared to lead Haiti.

Jesus told His disciples, "No one who puts his hand to the plow and looks back is fit for service in the kingdom of God." The vision beckons, but we must remain focused on it. Developing Christian leaders for Haiti is our goal.

From the early years of preschool, children at New Missions learn they are someone special. We now have 25 churches and schools in Haiti. Our newest location is in the village of Calitor on the Leogane Plain. The pastor and school director is Fanfan Michel and when he was a young student at New Missions, I gave him keyboard lessons at our first church. It is a great joy to see our graduates now leading their communities and helping to change the lives of children.

Right now, hundreds of students enrolled in our high school do not have a sponsor. Please join us this month by supporting our High School Fund for unsponsored high school students. Their self-worth is grown from a place of despair and lack of hope—to a new found faith that changes lives. ~Timothy DeTellis

REFLECTING THE HEART OF GOD

New Missions sponsor Tammy Rahn noticed a recurring theme while reading through Scripture. Verse after verse described God's heart for "the least of these," and Jesus' ministry showed His love and provision for the poor and hungry. After discovering these truths, her own heart reflected her Father's priorities. "To have the heart of God, you can't help but want to feed the hungry," says Tammy.

This realization spurred Tammy into action. After many trips to Haiti, she was familiar with the needs of the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere. Tammy had interacted with the poor and hungry and knew there was more to be done. Even before last year's catastrophic earthquake, many Haitians struggled to eat enough to survive. The disaster only intensified the problem. "Scripture commands us to always have a heart attentive to the poor," says Tammy. "To me, that is Haiti. I believe that is where God's heart is." She began to raise money with her church to provide rice for families in Haiti. Through fundraisers, Newport Assembly of God in Pennsylvania raised over \$5,000 to feed the hungry.

In February 2011, Tammy and her family traveled to Haiti with other members of their church to distribute the rice they raised funds to purchase. The team held dry feedings at three New Missions schools. During the distributions, the team gave rice and oil to each student and prayed over each of them. The food and cooking items were then taken home to provide meals for entire families.

"I always get teary-eyed when a child gets a bag of rice," said Tammy. "It makes my day just to know something as simple as that makes such an impact in a life. I count it a privilege to be the hands and feet of God in Haiti. The Bible says we will always have the poor among us, but we always need to be among the poor—helping, encouraging, and lending a hand whenever we can."

Tammy and the team from Newport Assembly of God distributed food to about 850 students during their week in Haiti. Hundreds of families were blessed by the obedience and commitment of this church. The team was also blessed as they saw the promise of Proverbs 22:9 fulfilled – "A generous man will himself be blessed, for he shares his food with the poor."



It's the season—the lilies, tulips, daffodils...all the flowers I have missed over the years working on the Island of Hispaniola. And in the United States, there are Easter hats and Easter baskets, little chicks and candy eggs. It's Easter season!

For Christians, we rejoice in the words of Jesus in John 11:25, "I AM THE RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE."

If you have experienced the loss of a loved one, and the many memories pain your heart, rest in the words of Jesus, "Those who believe in Me, even though they

die like everyone else, will live again." John 11:25-26

Last night at church, nine year old Johanny came up to hug me. I remembered back to when she was 6 months old, and her mother died from lupus.

Death—we can't make it pretty.

When I am in Orlando and pass by the funeral home where my late husband George chose his own casket, the painful memories of his death

are smothered out like a hard-driving torrential rain on a wild fire with the words of Jesus, "I AM THE RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE."

LOGISTICS FOR PROGRESS

It's 8:00 a.m. on a Thursday, and the flatbed tractor trailer has arrived at New Missions in Orlando. Pressure treated lumber, piping and metal reinforcement materials are right on time. The deliveries are synchronized with the arrival of two 40-foot cargo containers. Within a few hours of leaving New Missions in Orlando, these much needed construction supplies will be on their way to Haiti.

We purchase as many materials in Haiti as possible—to support the local economy. However, some items are simply not available. We do have a source for tin roofing, concrete and blocks in Haiti; and since the early 80s we have used the same trucking company for all of our gravel and sand.

Behind the scenes is a man from South Carolina who provides the hidden ingredients to logistical planning: the price and source of materials. Dale Collins, from Seacoast Church in Summerville, is a volunteer for New Missions who contributes his expertise in construction material and suppliers.

Prior to the moment the tractor trailer arrives at customs in Port-au-Prince, the proper paperwork is filed and arrangements for delivery begin. As soon as the trailers arrive at the mission, there are sounds of rejoicing. The work continues, and because of your continued prayers and support, we are building a new Haiti. ~Timothy DeTellis






CONSTRUCTION YEAR-ROUND

We now have the majority of our main infrastructure for the administration of the mission in place. This year, we have received 14 containers consisting of building and medical supplies, and Christmas shoeboxes. Five buildings have recently been completed, and we are working on three more buildings at this time. A further evaluation of every location is currently taking place. We continue to tear down buildings damaged during the earthquake; this month, the church at Darbonne and the school at Fond-Jacques were torn down. Our backhoe tractor has been extremely useful for the demolition of buildings.

It was wonderful to be working in the Brache-Milot, Darbonne, and Fond-Jacques schools this month. In addition to these locations, we are very




thankful to have a new "container warehouse," where we organize our building supplies for future projects. In the past, 90 percent of our buildings had concrete block walls. Our current building plans consist of using all wood or metal for any schools or churches, as they would hold up better if there were another earthquake to strike the island. We earnestly want to complete the rebuilding as quickly as possible, and are working according to a priority of building needs. Eventually, we would like to launch out into further locations—establishing additional schools and churches.

Thank you for your prayers as we continue the rebuilding process. It is a joy to be serving God in Haiti.

GOD'S ORCHESTRATIONS

When it comes to planning, I'm all in. It's important to plan and appropriately assign the required resources (time, people, and tools) to achieve the desired outcome. I enjoy the dreaming and designing sides of life. From ideas to implementation, I find a great sense of reward. However, I welcome my planning to be trumped by God's divine orchestration. Yes, God is in our planning process—but He is also Lord over the outcome.

God's will (sovereignty) is the ultimate power. While I believe in the free will of man I also believe that God can trump us whenever He wants. He's God! Proverbs 16:3 says, "Commit to the Lord whatever you do, and He will establish your plans."

When it comes to planning, my prayer is: "God give me the wisdom and discernment to make the best decision, and may Your will be done!"

During the planning phase for rebuilding in Haiti, we determined

which building would be placed on the top priority list by focusing on the most urgent needs. On one of my trips after the earthquake, one of my sponsored children, Catiana, and I shared lunch together. I asked her if she was discouraged because her school building was gone. She and her classmates were temporarily meeting inside the dining hall. To my surprise she just smiled and said, "I'm happy to go to school." On a personal note, months later, my heart jumped for joy the day I saw the photo of Catiana proudly standing in front of the new elementary school at Bord-Mer. Two new buildings were constructed on that campus due to earthquake damage.

My weakness is patience—as it's hard to simply watch and wait. God's timing is perfect. I'm going

to do all I can on my part and then give God the authority to be God in my life. All throughout the planning process, I've invited God to pour in. I actually believe that He is the source of ideas and creativity, so we are "best-partners" in anything I do. God's plans are best. "But the plans of the Lord stand firm forever, the purposes of His heart through all generations." Psalm 33:11

Recently, I had a meeting with a church regarding partnering with New Missions for building a new Haiti. The pastor asked me a question few have ever asked me. "If you could do anything, what would you do?" My response, "Build a trade school." He replied, "Build it and I'll help pay for the construction." This June, we will break ground on a trade school at New Missions in Haiti. The school will train

Haitians in construction trades and management. God's timing surprised me. With all of the construction that continues in Haiti, this trade school will provide many opportunities for graduates of New Missions.

The trade school has been a dream of ours for many years. Now, God's timing makes it perfect. God's orchestration happens when we welcome it, invite it, and even expect or pray for it. That's the balance between the free will of man and the sovereignty of God. We must live with an open-hand policy. I'm in awe of God's orchestrations...not my strategies.

I pray to see God make the plans that change lives. I believe that Jesus is still the answer for the world today. He brings real hope. In whatever we do, let's ask God for wisdom and then serve others. "If you do not have wisdom, ask God for it. He is always ready to give it to you and will never say you are wrong for asking." James 1:5 Has God's orchestration surprised you lately? ~Timothy DeTellis

I found Luis—and he had the same gentle, tender, loving spirit as Luc. I could feel his lean frame as I hugged him, and I felt like I found a new grandson.

I apologized to Luis for the little gift, and he melted me with what he said: "Not important at all; it is your love for me that is important to me." I never wanted to stop embracing Luis, as I loved him with words and a prayer. Luis is the son of a single mother from the mountains, and his mother has been working for the owners of the condo

WORSHIP SPREADS THE GOSPEL

Across the Leogane Plain, people gather at churches to worship, in an area that was known as the Voodoo capital of Haiti. When New Missions began in 1983, I remember traveling village by village hosting outdoor evangelism meetings, as there were few Christians to be found. Along dirt roads, we would turn the back of a pick-up truck into a stage, and play worship songs and preach the Gospel. One by one, people of the village would respond as we returned each week. Finally, with a handful of Christians, we would start a church.

I have two memories when worship in Haiti shaped my perspective of what it means to surrender. The first was at our church in Bord-Mer. Since I played the keyboard, I found myself arriving early to church—turning on the sound system and setting up. There was no predetermined schedule. The music was selected at random according to God's leading. It was led by the Spirit, and the congregation was willing to wait upon the Lord.

My second memory was right after the earthquake. While driving down the road and throughout the night, we could hear the Haitians singing songs of praise to God—after the most horrific disaster to hit Haiti in 200 years.

Worship spreads the Gospel, and the Haitians' singing is the testimony of lives changed. Their passion for God is loud, and their worship is spreading the Gospel across Haiti. ~Tim DeTellis

WHO DO YOU KNOW?

IF YOU KNOW JESUS-

YOU KNOW EVERYBODY!

You've heard the old saying, it's not what you know that matters...it's who you know. True to life, being able to call someone who can help you is more powerful than a head full of knowledge. In every sector of society there is a web of relationships of "people who know people." You may have a great idea for a movie, or could have written an amazing song. But, unless you have relationships in those industries, it is very unlikely that your work will become more than words on a page.

Whenever I have written to a corporation or foundation seeking support for our ministry, I have always failed—unless I first had a contact who was able to navigate me through the web of relationships

to reach the right person. This is especially true in finding a great job. For the right person, a company is always hiring! It's all about the right relationships.

If we extend the old maxim, we can add that often who you don't know is who you need to know. Social scientists have observed we are a maximum of six relationships away from anybody in the world! So, a person you know has a relationship with someone who knows someone...who knows the person you need to know.

No matter how many books you read, or how much education you receive, what you don't know will always exceed what you do know. Deuteronomy 29:29 tells us, "The secret things belong to God, but that which has been revealed belongs to us." Our God is omniscient; He knows everything. God knows your mind and body better than any doctor in the world.

In my work in ministry, I am always trying to learn something new, or make contact with people

I don't know. I am fond of saying, "If you know Jesus, you know everybody," because Jesus knows everybody and everything. We have the powerful source of knowledge in our relationship with God. He is able to open doors and reveal knowledge to us beyond our own abilities. As a believer, you are only one relationship away from the person you need to know.

I often meet pastors who spend the majority of their time caring for a small congregation of people when there are a million people in the city—most of whom have never been invited to church! The pastor desperately wants to see his church grow, but spends much of his time meeting with the same people.

Thank you for joining us in sharing a little Christmas with the children of Haiti.



OFFERING TO THE LORD

On her way to the Dominican Republic, Esther Hoon wondered why she agreed to bring her guitar on a mission trip with the group from Southwestern College in Winfield, Kansas. It was difficult to stow and frustrating to carry around, but God quickly made His purpose clear.

According to Chad Pickett, the team's leader, the purpose of the trip was "simply putting smiles on children's faces and making them feel loved." While the team taught songs and Bible lessons, Esther observed that the small things brought the children great joy and were truly making a difference. She recalls, "Seeing the joy and love that the kids shared with us, even though they had so little, changed me."

Esther's heart broke for the Dominican students, and she asked God to show her what else she could do. Esther thought, "I'm pretty sure He didn't just send me all the way here to be with these kids for a few days, and then go back to my own little world." As she prayed, she remembered the words of King David, "I will not offer to the Lord that which cost me nothing," and realized that she had one offering that would cost her something—her guitar. Though giving her guitar away would be a sacrifice, God was tugging at her heart.

After a service, she went to speak with one of the missionaries, hoping he would say there was not a need for a guitar. Instead, he gladly accepted it and told Esther about a music school where it could be used. She was invited to visit two days later and was even able to teach some kids how to play guitar.

"Now that I no longer have a guitar, every time I miss it, I am reminded of how blessed I was on this trip to the DR. I remember all the kids and

When a missionary working with our Bible School left, Pastor George contemplated closing the Bible School. I pleaded with him to allow me to take on the oversight of the school, and he agreed. We created the Caribbean Bible Institute—offering courses in Bible, education and business.

New Missions makes our Bible School graduation the event of highest celebration. There are caps and gowns, a marching band, and quite a feast! What is most exciting about our Bible School is that in God, there is no unemployment. God is always calling men and women into the ministry.

When Pastor George passed away in 2008, we wanted to remember his sacrifice and discipline to serve God by using money given in his honor to provide free Bible School for our future leaders of Haiti and the Dominican Republic. His legacy lives on. ~Jeanne DeTellis O'Connor

Your God dream will be unique to you. Eight-year-old Sarah from Carmel, Indiana, told the congregation at her church, "Just don't buy candy, and you'll

have money to feed hungry children." She saw her dream come true—to provide 50,000 meals.

During the last year of his life (2007/2008), Pastor George often preached about his God dream. He invited men and women to dream his dream to continue the mission...and they did! The mission moves on with Bible schools—training hundreds in leadership, and more than 11,000 children are becoming the new Christian generation. His God dream continues to live on. (Pastor George and I founded New Missions in 1983. After a nine-year battle with cancer, he went "home" on June 26, 2008).

In the new year of 2009 I felt compelled to inspire people to have dreams for their lives. From time to time, people asked me about my dreams. I have dreams: a ring, gold, royal robe and chariot from a generous God—our ministry in the Dominican Republic and Haiti—for the past 30 years.

Now, I'm 69 years old. Maybe enough is enough? No! On April 11, I went to Bombita in the pouring rain. I asked the yardman for a shovel and called the students to the corner of our mission property and broke ground on what has been an impossible dream to build a school. I did not have one peso promised—only a fire in my heart and love for these little ones who had been having school for more than six years in a tent. Imagine the rains, the dampness

of school books and papers. Think of our teachers with sore throats and colds—teaching in the outdoor winds—but on their mission to give this impoverished community a school.

On May 15, while speaking at a church in Indiana, an unknown

woman gave my husband, Dennis, \$200. I knew I had to call this \$200 the first pesos to build the school in Bombita. It takes courageous strength to express your dream. You may stand alone, or your dream may even feel like a nightmare! It's invigorating to your faith.

Remember, even if your dream has been shattered, the one thing that will always remain constant is the life Jesus freely offers you. Life with Him now—peace, purpose, and life without end. Dream a God dream!

TRADE SCHOOL IN HAITI

Today, we rejoice in God's provision for us to establish a Trade School at New Missions in Haiti. Located on the Signeau Elementary School property, and expected to open in 2012, the school will provide Haitians the opportunity to learn a trade—giving them greater opportunities for employment. Margo Womac, director of Ministry Network at Second Baptist, believes that through this project they "are able to help people help themselves" and truly impact families.

Second Baptist Church in Houston sent a construction team to begin this project and the partnership will continue far beyond the construction phase. Womac expressed that Second Baptist's desire is to have their church members return to the trade school to teach various skills (such as woodworking, plumbing, etc.) to the teachers.

When the team from Second Baptist visited Haiti in June, they broke ground on the project and constructed pads for the buildings. Throughout the week, the team also distributed gifts from their church family. Womac observed "love and playing together translate across any language." The relationships that formed led to an unexpected addition to the week's agenda—the decision to build a soccer field for the children. WHY LEAVE TO HELP

The story of how a mission trip changes lives is too often buried under "life" when we return home. Below are questions asked of David Dean, a personal friend, who leads mission teams to New Missions in the Dominican Republic.

Tim: On your most recent trip to the D.R., what long-term impact did the team feel they made in the lives of the Dominicans?

David: It usually occurs in the moments we never planned. Six to seven months prior to each of our trips, we begin meeting to discuss how we plan on sharing Jesus with the locals. More often than not, ministry moments take place off our agenda—spur of the moment prayer time with someone who is ill or who recently lost a loved one.

Tim: After a trip, what is life like? **David:** Arriving guns blazin' in the D.R. is the easy part. Returning home to the frenzied pace of our internet driven world can be overwhelming. A day after we came home from our trip I tweeted, "I spent a week in the Dominican Republic and not once did I watch TV or read a newspaper."

Tim: Spiritually, how has your involvement in missions drawn you closer to God? **David:** I'm a big fan of David Livermore's book on short-term missions called, "Serving With Eyes Wide Open." Livermore writes that often times, our teams are so consumed with the "stuff" we plan on bringing to the locals

that we forget what the locals are longing for the most: our presence. Like our children, the most valuable commodity we can give is our time. So these trips have taught me that my prayer-Bible time are THE most important moments in my day.

Tim: When it comes to your prayer for the people of the Dominican Republic, what is deep in your heart for them? **David:** The most common request I hear from the locals before we pray for them is that they would "stay hungry for God." How ironic is that—coming from a people who long to squeeze in one or two small meals a day? It's a great prayer for my Dominican friends; a great prayer for us.

Thank you, David, for your passion for the people of the Dominican Republic. It's contagious! ~ Timothy DeTellis

SPOONS FOR HAITI



For many children it means getting up from the mud floor where they slept, and going outdoors to find a private place to be their "necessary room." How far is the stream or the well to find water to get clean? Then, they put on their school uniform and begin their walk to a mission school. This is all they have ever known, and they feel so proud to be a student! Hunger is with them the moment they awake, and as they try to keep their tummy quiet to fall asleep.

New Missions provides a hearty cooked meal at school. But, there are rules—good ones to protect health and life. Each student must wash their hands before eating. Eating without a spoon is not the best option for a child. We do not want them to eat with their hands, even though they may do this at home. Hungry, without a spoon, their eyes search for a friend who will let them borrow his or her spoon.

A spoon...what a blessing we can be with something so small. Go buy spoons...buy hundreds of spoons! Buy them for the child, for their family, and buy them for the village. You can find them at yard sales or thrift shops. Not only are you providing them a hot lunch at school, but also the spoon to eat their meal.

THE LOVE TO FORGIVE

I have a tendency to remember wrong done against me. God has told us to forgive and to love our enemies. If we are judging people, we end up judging ourselves. Have we not also done wrong things? We are in need of forgiveness from God, others, and ourselves. In John chapter 8, the teachers of the law and the Pharisees wanted to stone a woman accused of adultery. But, Jesus said, "Let any one of you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." John 8:7

The inability to forgive will have a negative impact on our lives and those around us. I have seen this time and time again. Many families have stopped speaking to one another because of past offenses. I recently

enjoyed the movie, "The King's Speech." The king had a speech impediment, and for various reasons had issues with anger. Apparently, his anger was also the source of his speech impediment. It seems some people can grow angry and bitter in life. We all know that life is full of challenges. However, we cannot let life get us down. We need to be full of love in a fallen world, and have a positive impact upon those we meet along this journey. We cannot do this if we are angry, depressed or burdened—as we will not achieve our greatest potential.

None of us like when bad things happen to us. As a child, I could not speak clearly. When I was teased, I thought I'd never forget these offenses. However, we must let the offenses roll away like water on the feathers of a duck. We have a new life in Christ and must walk in our freedom, peace, and love.

1 Corinthians 13 speaks all about love. We must do all things in love, and must not keep account of wrongs. We have been saved by grace, and are not to react negatively when bad things happen. If we do good deeds, but have not love, we are nothing. I emphasize this with construction teams in Haiti.

Right now, we are finishing up a beautiful church in the mountains of Haiti. I often tell the workers that they are anointed for the task. In the Old Testament,

when the workers worked on the temple, they were anointed workers. God does not need just anyone... He wants workers who love like He loves! It has been amazing how three different teams have worked on this building. They have each

complimented the creation of this beautiful church built with wood. When we give a gift to a community, we want to give a good gift—as it is a reflection of the kingdom of God. Finally, we must find our self-worth in the eyes of God, not in the eyes of man. In the Lord's Prayer we are told to forgive our debtors as we are also forgiven. Forgiveness is a character of our God of love.

ARE YOU A SCHOOL

WHO SURROUNDS YOU?

Proverbs 13:20 says, "He who walks with wise men will be wise, but the companion of fools will suffer harm."

Do you have a built-in security system? Are you surrounding yourself with people who build you up? The key is discernment.

First, let's look at the people you need to avoid at all costs.

Gossipers: Gossipers are masters at sucking you into conversations filled with bad news, bad thoughts and bad attitudes. Spending too much time with gossipers will easily contaminate you. When confronted with a gossiper, learn to say, "Sorry, I'm not interested." Warning: entering into a gossiping relationship will significantly damage your reputation as you will lose the trust and respect of others.

Discouragers: Here's a piece of advice for you: attitude is contagious! When negative people come your way, they have one goal, and that's to take a bite out of your good day. Please know there is a difference between offering encouragement to someone who needs it, and someone just taking away from you. When I encounter a discourager, I begin to pray to myself, "God, may You comfort their heart like no one can."

<u>Complainers:</u> Beware of the complainer! Everyone has the potential to either be part of the solution or part of the problem. If all you do is complain without ever offering a solution, you do nothing more than add to the problem. If you are going to complain, at least offer a way to improve matters. Don't let complainers steer you in reverse. Instead, continue stepping through problems by asking good questions and learning from mistakes.

Now, let's look at those with whom you should build lasting relationships.

Believers: Have you ever met someone who looks for the best in all situations? One thing you'll notice about them—they tend to see the potential in people. Seek out "believers." These people infuse and energize you with great confidence. These are not people who merely say "yes," but individuals who truly believe in you.

<u>Learners:</u> The more I meet people, the most common thread in people I enjoy spending time with is that they are learners. These people are always listening with both ears, and have an appetite for knowledge. Learners are forward thinking and care about what's best. Are you a learner? If so, then find other learners and share ideas.

<u>Doers:</u> Success is never accidental. Whenever success happens, there is always someone behind the

scenes making it a reality. Nothing truly successful happens without hard work by motivated people. Doers know how to plan, implement, achieve and succeed. High-level doers delegate to highly qualified people—to execute the plan. Do you want to be a doer? If so, find them, then observe and learn.

From a leadership standpoint, who you avoid and who you surround yourself with will help determine your success. Guard yourself against people

who will steal your joy. When you wake up each day, seek to do what honors God, and pray that He helps you to be a good influence on others.

"Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things." Philippians 4:8 ~Timothy DeTellis

Generosity is a lifestyle, not a campaign. "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys, and where thieves do not break in or steal; for where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." Matthew 6:19-21

Let's stay focused on the eternal purpose of our lives.

Ongoing construction remains one of our top priorities, and we've been blessed to have had some wonderful teams assist us in this process. To date, construction has taken place at twelve of our locations. We continue to purchase building materials each month, as several buildings still need to be torn down and rebuilt. We're primarily building with pressure treated lumber, and have plans to import two buildings which will be prefabricated with steel beams. Also, on our construction list is the expansion of our high school chapel. These are exciting days!

Each of our buildings has a purpose. Our schools, churches, and medical clinics are changing lives. I am amazed at the transformation which has taken place in our community over the years. It's wonderful to know the children are healthy and educated. Recently, while visiting our Bord-Mer church, I was taken back by the spiritual freedom and vigor the children expressed. James 2:5 says, "...has not God chosen those who are poor in the world to be rich in faith and heirs of the kingdom, which He has promised to those who love Him?"

We can look at the challenges the Haitians endure—poverty, disease, and pollution to name a few. Yet one thing this life can't take from them is their faith in the Lord.



SHARING YOUR FOOD

When you read Proverbs 19:17, "When you give to the poor, you lend to the Lord," what does it mean to you? I think that when you share what you have, God sees your unselfishness, and when you are in need, He remembers that you shared with others in need.

In Haiti, many visitors have observed the children sharing food with one another. A child in Haiti learns at any early age that sharing is a way of surviving. Their thoughts are, "Today, I share with you...and tomorrow you'll share with me." In a country where there is a daily struggle for survival, it is almost impossible for people to have any food to store at home.

I remember our first year living in Haiti and the shock of people dying from malnutrition. After the first year of feeding the school children, we rejoiced when we overheard people saying no one had died from hunger.

How do you feel when you're hungry? My thoughts and sole attention are focused on what I can find to eat. How can we fulfill our mission to disciple and educate students if their hunger makes it impossible to listen in class or concentrate on their homework? A lack of nutrition at an early age will rob them of their mental and physical development. I can't imagine a hungry child earnestly listening to a Bible school lesson, but I can imagine a child feeling the love of God and following Jesus because of His hand feeding him faithfully, day after day.

Our Haitian children pray, "Give us this day our daily bread." And every day, God's people, just like you, are giving to the poor—sharing your bread with the children in Haiti.





I am praying for you that you will not have need. I ask God to bless you with a big loaf of bread in your home every day, and that you can share a piece of your bread with the children in Haiti. You may remember as a child being taught by your mother to say thank you—learning your table manners. There are also Spiritual table manners.

The Bible trains us to give thanks. "O give thanks to the LORD, for He is good." 1 Chronicles 16:34

Only one of the ten healed lepers 1 CHRONICLES 16:34 returned to find Jesus and fell on his face, saying, "Thank you." Jesus asked, "Were there not ten healed?" Luke 17:17

A woman of a bad reputation came into a home where Jesus was sitting with friends. The power of His presence overwhelmed her. She recognized Jesus as her Savior. Her tears flowed—dripping on His feet. With her long hair, tears, and perfume from an alabaster vial, she cleansed Jesus' feet as an act of love from a thankful heart (Luke 7:36-50).

BAPTISM FESTIVALS

Last month in Haiti, there were 59 believers who were publicly baptized in water as a witness that they have now begun a new journey in life with their best friend, Jesus.

One of the believers was Rose Varda—born at a time in Haiti when there was much political unrest in the 90's. Her mother died in childbirth, and a neighbor in Concrab took her in. Our mission supplied formula to sustain her life. Rose came to faith as a young teenager, and she now works at our Mission Training Center.

In the Dominican Republic, 10 youth were baptized. For two months they attended classes with Youth Pastor Felix Martinez and Deacon Jorge Espinoza. Among the youth are budding leaders. Jose Manuel has a ministry in sports to the local children; Jose Miguel is part of the youth praise band; and both Cesar Frias and Mason Jacques are in our music teaching ministry.

When Jesus was baptized, God the Father was delighted, and the Holy Spirit descended. We praise God for new believers in Haiti and the Dominican Republic, obeying Jesus through water baptism. We ask God for His Spirit to descend and hover over each one. ~Jeanne DeTellis O'Connor

BOMBITA SCHOOL

The ministry of New Missions in Bombita began one day when Pastor George was walking around the town of Sosua, looking for someone to share Jesus with, and to invite to church. Pastor George met Nancy, a woman from Charamicos in the Dominican Republic, who married a man from Austria. Nancy's husband, Karl, owned land in Bombita—down a long and winding dirt road. Through our many visits with Nancy, New Missions began to minister to the Dominican community. Karl let us use their land to put up a canopy to begin a church and school.

The name Bombita is the Spanish word for a little Bomba. Bomba is the Spanish word for a water pump. A Jewish community settled in Sosua during the Holocaust, and went to Bombita to start a dairy farm. Their water pump was one of the first water sources, and the community still calls it Bombita today.

For seven years New Missions has been ministering in Bombita—through a church and school (which has been held in a tent). On April 11, 2011, the children gathered with me to say a soft and simple prayer that God would give us a school building.

In August, work on the foundation began—thanks to people with a heart for missions and education. During the month of September, construction stopped for two weeks—as we needed additional funds to continue. In October, construction was scheduled to stop again, because we lacked \$4,000. But, the funds came in the following week, and construction resumed.

The most indescribable and unspeakable joy of this construction project is to see, hear, and feel the faith of the children growing in God.

Each day they pray—thanking God for each donor by name. They thank God for the construction—and their faith grows as the walls go higher and higher.

My heart feels the emotion and excitement of the children, teachers, parents and community. I am confident God is pleased that this land in Bombita stands as a Christian witness, and is providing the community with an excellent school to bring forth a harvest for generations to come.

I appreciate your love for the children of Bombita. They have an opportunity to grow in God and to have a future to be blessed and be a blessing.

Thank you for your generous donations that have allowed us to continue building. I am trusting God to provide the additional \$60,000 needed to complete the school.

Just the fact that they wake up, bathe, and dress for school makes their life better than 50% of the children in Haiti who have no school to go to. The simple encouragement of wearing a school uniform shapes the child's perspective for the day. Along the road to school they meet other friends who join them on their journey.

Encouragement is a key ingredient in our schools. Our teachers see the potential in each child—mainly because most of our teachers were once in a New Missions' classroom themselves. Inside the school, our children find hope in Jesus. Our Christian teachers share a Bible lesson each day. This is the foundation of their learning, and we are growing strong new leaders for Haiti.

Favorite subjects of the children include geography, history, mathematics and writing. Recently, I was in a classroom at New Missions and they had a geography trivia competition between the boys and girls. It was an energy packed classroom! They would jump to their feet with the answer...and when the teacher announced which team won, that group of students would erupt with cheers! Learning at New Missions is fun, encouraging, and life changing. ~Tim DeTellis
